Hudson Baylor Corporation**

**Project Background**

Hudson Baylor Corporation (HBC) is a recycling company in Newburgh, which was founded in 1983 to help distributors process containers generated as a result of the State's Bottle Deposit Law. The business has since expanded to provide recycling services for municipalities, waste haulers, beverage distributors, and others. In addition to aluminum, plastic and glass containers, Hudson Baylor now recycles all grades of paper and offers a confidential document destruction service.

**Project Description**

Environmental Investment Program (EIP) funds helped finance a total upgrade of the Hudson Baylor fiber processing operation at the 237 DuPont Avenue Facility in Newburgh. This upgrade included a renovation of the fiber processing facility by adding two new processing lines, one for low grade paper and a second for high grade paper. The high grade processing line enables HBC to comply with the National Association for Information Destruction. The HGP system includes a separate enclosed tip area, sorting line, paper shredder and a storage conveyor that feeds the existing baling system. The low grade line includes an expanded tip hall with separate tip halls for ONP and OCC, and a new sort line that feeds the existing baling system.

An exterior site upgrade included adding a new traffic pattern with a large truck scale, truck turn around area and truck exit to speed the increased receiving and shipping of material.

**Project Results**

The upgrade of the entire fiber system has enhanced the processing capacity to meet the ongoing demand for increased paper recycling from the entire Mid-Hudson and Tri-State Region. This project has enabled Hudson Baylor to increase its recycling capacity of various grade of paper by 52,612 tons per year. HBC increased its annual sales revenue by \$1.6 million and added six full time employees.

This project has allowed the company to increase its paper processing capacity, and upgrade its sorting and document destruction service. This was the third EIP investment at Hudson Baylor. In 1999, the company received assistance for the purchase of plastics processing equipment that increased the facility's capacity to process plastic containers while better separating resin types and colors. It also enabled Hudson Baylor to granulate the sorted plastics for added value and transportation savings. In 2003, HBC received assistance to upgrade its fiber baling capacity which enabled it to position itself for the incremental growth of paper recycling.
